- ▶ The DSP is a major community benefit; making it possible for our partners to receive high-quality evaluation services that many would otherwise not have access to.
- ▶ The web platform is a valuable tool for partner agencies, providing case management and an overview of performance for students in their program.
- ▶ Secure sharing of student data for evaluation purposes enables a centralized, consistent process for community agencies to obtain student information and consistent monitoring and tracking of student participation.

Our web platform provides a central repository to record and track program data. Partner agency staff can view and access student-level school system data about children enrolled in their program.
